I want to begin by congratulating everyone who has been involved in the planning, construction and equipping of the new Joseph P. Mazzola Training Center, which was formally dedicated last month.

### VITAL TO FUTURE

I've said it a thousand times, but I can't emphasize enough the importance of training to the future of Local 38 members.

We sell our labor, and the edge we have, the reason contractors sign our contract, is our knowledge and expertise. Any contractor can pick up unskilled labor for next to nothing. There are plenty of workers available to do a bad job for low wages and no benefits.

But the reason we make a living wage and receive good benefits is because of our knowledge and expertise. Our contractors can make a profit because when they call the Local 38 dispatch hall they get the best trained, most knowledgeable workers in the pipe trades. We can do the work quickly, efficiently and well. We know the latest techniques and equipment.

Some of this expertise comes from the experience of working the job on a daily basis. But now maybe more important is the training our members receive in the classroom.

### TRAINING APPRENTICES

This training begins with Local 38 apprentices.

Local 38's training is for a career. We take in apprentices with the goal of making them top quality plumbing, pipefitting and HVAC/R mechanics. Our instructors work with apprentices to make sure they have the skills and knowledge necessary to build a career in the pipe trades. Our training combines on-the-job experience and classroom knowledge and expertise. We require not only that our apprentices work a certain number of hours, but that their work cover all aspects of their trade. And that on-the-job experience of learning how to do the work is backed up by classroom instruction about why the work is done that way. By the time our apprentices turn out they have a complete education in preparation for their lifetime career in the trades.

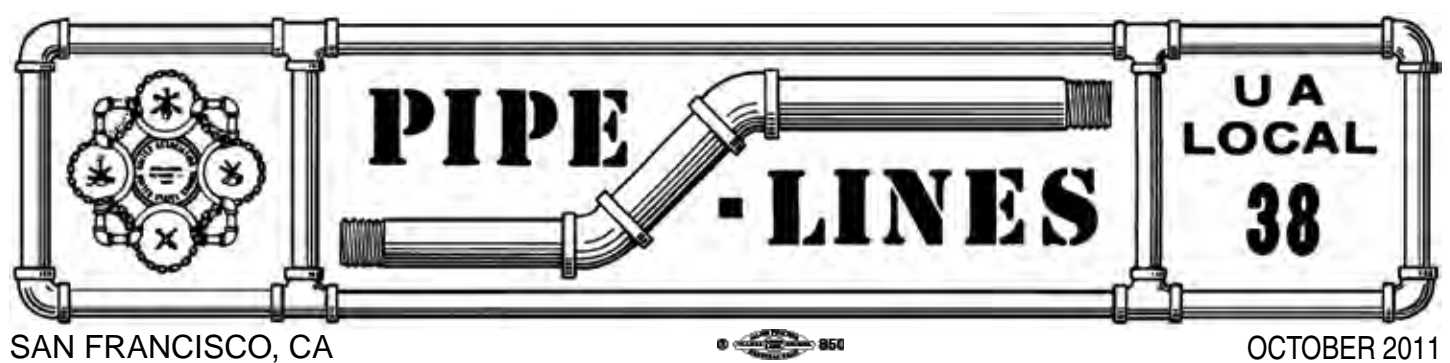
### SUPPLEMENTARY JOURNEYMAN TRAINING

But that's not enough. We also provide supplementary journeyman training classes to make sure our workers can keep up with the changing technology and equipment in the trade. The tools, equipment and techniques used in the pipe trades are changing as fast as everything else in the world, and our journeymen need to be ready to meet new challenges.

## Local 38 Dedicates the new Joseph P. Mazzola Training Center

Local 38 celebrated its future last month, with the **unveiling of the new Joseph P. Mazzola Training Center first at the formal dedication ceremony, and then at an open house for Local 38 members.**

"This is a great achievement for Local 38," said Business Manager Larry Mazzola, Sr. "We all understand that training is the backbone of Local 38. All we have to sell is the knowledge and expertise of our

members. This facility will ensure that our members have a first-class facility for learning our trade for years to come."

### THE DEDICATION

Although classes had been held in the new school since the beginning of the fall semester in August, the formal grand opening and dedication ceremony was held on September 14. More than 150 people gathered in front of the entrance of the building, braving unseasonably

cold and damp weather to celebrate the new training facility.

On hand were a score of San Francisco dignitaries, including Mayor Edwin Lee and 10th District supervisor Malia Cohen (the school is located in San Francisco's 10th supervisorial district), and numerous United Association officers and friends, including Director of Training Mike Arndt and the Board of the International Training Fund.

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# National Scene

## Income Down, Poverty Up

**M**ore troubling news on the downward economic spiral of America's working families. In 2010, median household income declined and the poverty rate increased, according to U.S. Census Bureau data announced this morning.

Running counter to the American tradition of ever-rising prosperity, real median household income in the United States declined by 2.3 percent from 2009 to 2010, and now stands at \$49,445.

The nation's official poverty rate in 2010 was 15.1 percent, up from

14.3 percent in 2009, the third consecutive annual increase in the poverty rate. There were 46.2 million people in poverty in 2010, up from 43.6 million in 2009 — the fourth consecutive annual increase and the largest number in the 52 years for which poverty estimates have been published.

Behind the bad data are two factors, according to the Economic Policy Institute (EPI). First, the unemployment rate increased from 9.3 percent in 2009 to 9.6 percent in 2010. Second, long-term unemployment, or the percent unemployed 27 weeks or more, grew from 31.2 percent in 2009 to 43.3 percent in 2010.

Bottom line: America needs jobs. President Obama's American Jobs Act goes a long way toward

moving the nation toward desperately-needed job creation. So where are the Republicans in Congress on job creation? In yet one more sign that they prefer gamesmanship to aiding the American public, the St. Louis Beacon reports today about an appropriations bill approved by a Republican-led subcommittee would defund Amtrak in the Midwest and cut more than 10,000 jobs on transportation infrastructure.

## Long-Term Unemployment At Record High

**F**or more Americans, being out of work has become a semi-permanent condition.

Nearly one-third of the unemployed — nearly 4.5 million people — have had no job for a year or more. That's a record high. Many are older workers who have found it especially hard to find jobs.

And economists say their prospects won't brighten much even after the economy starts to strengthen and hiring picks up. Even if they can find a job, it will likely pay far less than their old ones did.

The outlook is unlikely to improve on Friday, when the government issues its monthly jobs report. Economists predict it will show that employers added a net 56,000 jobs in September.

That's far fewer than needed to reduce unemployment. The unemployment rate is expected to remain 9.1 percent for a third straight month.

## AFL-CIO to Launch Jobs Campaign

**T**he AFL-CIO announced Wednesday that it will launch a nationwide campaign next week to urge lawmakers to vote for job-creation programs.

On a conference call with reporters, AFL-CIO President Richard Trumka cited the rhetoric of the "Occupy Wall Street" protests, saying people are angry about the struggling economy and want to get back to work.

"We have an economy and a political process that isn't serving the 99 percent," Trumka said. "America truly does want to work and working people are ready to make that happen."

The campaign by the nation's largest labor federation will kick off Monday with hundreds of events across the country. The effort will support President Obama's American Jobs Act, a \$447 billion proposal that will fund rebuilding of the nation's infrastructure, modernizing schools and aid to local and state governments.

In addition, the campaign will call for taxes to rise on America's wealthiest to help pay for the job-creation measures.

"We must make decisions to help the 99 percent of people by asking the top 1 percent to pay their fair share," Trumka said.

Trumka said workers will not ease pressure on lawmakers to move on unions' jobs agenda.

"They are not going to go away," said the labor leader.

## November 8 Endorsements

**E**lections for three public offices and eight propositions will be on the ballot for San Francisco voters in the November 8 citywide election. Voters will decide on the offices of Mayor, District Attorney and Sheriff, as well as various propositions. It is important for San Francisco voters to remember that since 2005 the election of public officials is done by "ranked choice voting" with voters listing their first, second and third choices on the ballot. Through a series of counts and eliminations, the candidate who is determined to have a majority of the ballots cast (50% + 1) is elected to office.

The following endorsements have been determined by the Local 38 Committee on Political Education (COPE), after often difficult consideration. Your COPE has determined its endorsements after considering labor voting records, interviews with candidates or proposition backers, the positions of other unions and union organizations (such as the San Francisco Central Labor Council and the San Francisco Building and Construction Trades Council), and responsiveness to the needs of working men and women throughout the city. The following are the COPE endorsements for the upcoming November 8 election:

- District Attorney . . . . . **George Gascon**
- Sheriff . . . . . **Chris Cunnie**
- Measure A - School Bonds . . . . . **YES**  
This measure would authorize a \$531 million bond measure to complete the renovation on the last 50 of the San Francisco School District's 140 schools.
- Measure B - Road repaving and Street Safety Bonds. . . . . **NR**  
This measure authorizes a \$248 million bond measure for road repaving and street safety.
- Measure C - City Pension and Health Care Benefits . . . . . **YES**  
This is the pension and health care benefit reform measure that resulted from extensive negotiation with city unions, and a coalition of city organizations.
- Measure D - City Pension Benefits . . . . . **NO**  
This is a pension reform measure drafted by San Francisco Public Defender Jeff Adachi and opposed by the city's unions the Chamber of Commerce, and other city officials.
- Measure E - Amending and Repealing Legislative Initiative Ordinances and Declarations of Policy . . . . . **NO**  
This measure would allow San Francisco's Board of Supervisors to amend or repeal voter passed initiatives, within specific guidelines.
- Measure F - Campaign Consultant Ordinance . . . . . **NO**  
The measure would change the registration and disclosure requirements for political campaign consultants.
- Measure G - Sales Tax . . . . . **YES**  
This measure would institute a .5 percent (one-half of one percent) sales tax for a period of 10 years to fund public safety, and services to children and seniors.
- Measure H - School District Student Assignment . . . . . **NO**  
This measure would alter the way students are assigned to schools giving priority to the schools' proximity to the students' neighborhoods.

HVAC/R Service Technicians may also pursue a Bachelor Degree from Ferris State University, an HVACR Technology AAS Degree or the new Sustainable Technologies in HVAC/R Degree. Local 38 Journeymen and Apprentices completing their 5-year apprenticeship program are eligible to take this exam.

Exams will be held in Santa Rosa on Wednesday, November 2, 2011 and in San Francisco on Wednesday, November 16.

This exam is held in a proctored setting and is administered and graded by National ITC, Inc.

Local 38 will assist you with this examination by paying the test registration fee. Local 38 will also provide you with a STAR study guide free of charge.

We do recommend that if you are interested in taking the exam that you pick up a study guide and begin your review right away. At this time no review classes are scheduled however, if there is enough interest we can hold classes.

## A Proud Portrayal Of Local 38 History

**I**n the entryway to the new Joseph P. Mazzola Training Center stands a newly painted mural, a proud tribute to the history of Local 38, and the life of former Local 38 Business Manager Joe Mazzola.

Of course the two are indelibly intertwined. Without the vision and energy of Joe Mazzola Local 38 would not have become what it

is today, one of the premier building trades unions in the country.

The mural—painted by noted Northern California artist Scott Sayre—is centered on a portrait of Joe Mazzola. Scenes surrounding the portrait depict memorable moments in Brother Mazzola’s life, and in the history of Local Union 38. Scenes range from a picture of Joe in a steward’s uniform, depicting the period in his

early life when he shipped out on passenger liners traveling to Alaska, to the ground-breaking at the Santa Rosa Training Center.

The mural is actually the second work that Local 38 has commissioned from Sayre honoring Brother Mazzola. The first mural that Sayre completed in 1990, hangs in the foyer of the Local 38 Union Hall on Market Street in San Francisco and depicts similar

scenes of Local 38 history and the life of Joe Mazzola.

“Joe dedicated his life to his members, his union and the labor movement,” says current Local 38 Business Manager Larry Mazzola, Sr. “And he understood the importance of education and training. It is fitting that he should be honored both at the union hall, and at the union’s training center “

Also attending were California State Senator Leland Yee, Assembly member Fiona Ma, and former SF Supervisor and current mayoral candidate Michela Alioto-Pier, as well as UA and labor leaders from throughout the state.

### A MOVING PROGRAM

The program, led by Master of Ceremonies Larry Mazzola, Jr., included a rendition of the National Anthem by Local 38 signatory contractor, instructor and noted tenor Ron Fahy, an invocation by Father John Itzaina of Saints Peter and Paul Church, and speeches by city and UA officials.

The highlight of the morning came when Mayor Lee and Brother Arndt took pipe cutters in hand and formally cut a ceremonial length of pipe, in place of the traditional ribbon cutting ceremony.

### MAYOR EDWIN LEE

“This facility will train generations of people who will work on our Transbay Terminal,” Mayor Lee said, “who will work on our America’s Cup facilities and all of the different improvements we are going to do. This training center will be here to train generations of people to be the best plumbers and pipefitters and to participate in the quality of life we can build for the city.

“This training center represents the idea that people can train themselves to better their lives,” Lee said, presenting a proclamation declaring September 14 as Joseph P. Mazzola Training Center Day in San Francisco.

### SUPERVISOR MALIA COHEN

“This is where labor, business and San Francisco leaders are going to come together to continue to move San Francisco into the 21st century,” SF Supervisor Cohen said, “and that training is going to happen right here at this facility.”

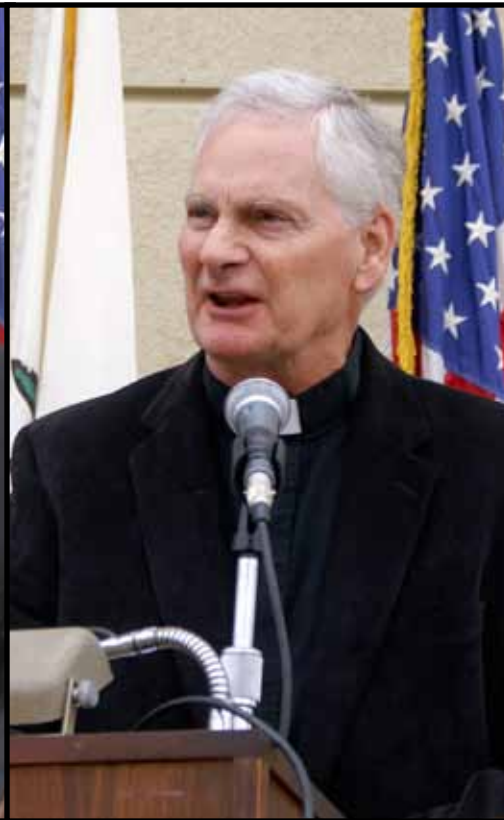

## GREEN BUILDING FEATURES:

**Site Selection**

Site selection is an important element to reduce the environmental impact of a building. By selecting a location with existing infrastructure and basic nearby amenities, the Joseph P. Mazzola Training Center minimizes environmental impact. Building components are further encouraged to utilize alternative methods of transportation. The Center features bike racks, storage, changing rooms, and showers, and bus stop within a quarter mile of the Center provide frequent service.

**Energy**

Interior spaces are often overlit, which wastes energy by providing higher lighting levels than required by users. The Joseph P. Mazzola Training Center reduced lighting power levels by 25 percent, saving energy and minimizing utility costs.

**Water Efficiency**

Water efficiency is a critical component of sustainable design. Water requires significant amounts of energy to treat, pump, heat and transport. Using low-flow toilets, dual flush toilets, and low-flow showers and kitchen sinks resulted in a 45 percent decrease in potable water consumption.

**Materials & Resources**

Construction and demolition debris comprise 22 percent of the entire landfilled waste stream of the USA, yet a significant portion of construction waste can be recycled. As a result the team minimized the waste sent to landfill from the debris of construction.

Furthermore, UA Local 38 has committed to long term occupancy of the Center, which will reduce the need for future tenant build outs, and corresponding material usage.

**Indoor Environmental Quality**

From the beginning of the construction phase, we closely monitored indoor air quality, both to protect the health of workers, and as the first step toward maximizing indoor air quality for occupants. We then selected low VOC-emitting adhesives, paints, flooring, cabinetry, and furniture to preserve optimal air quality.

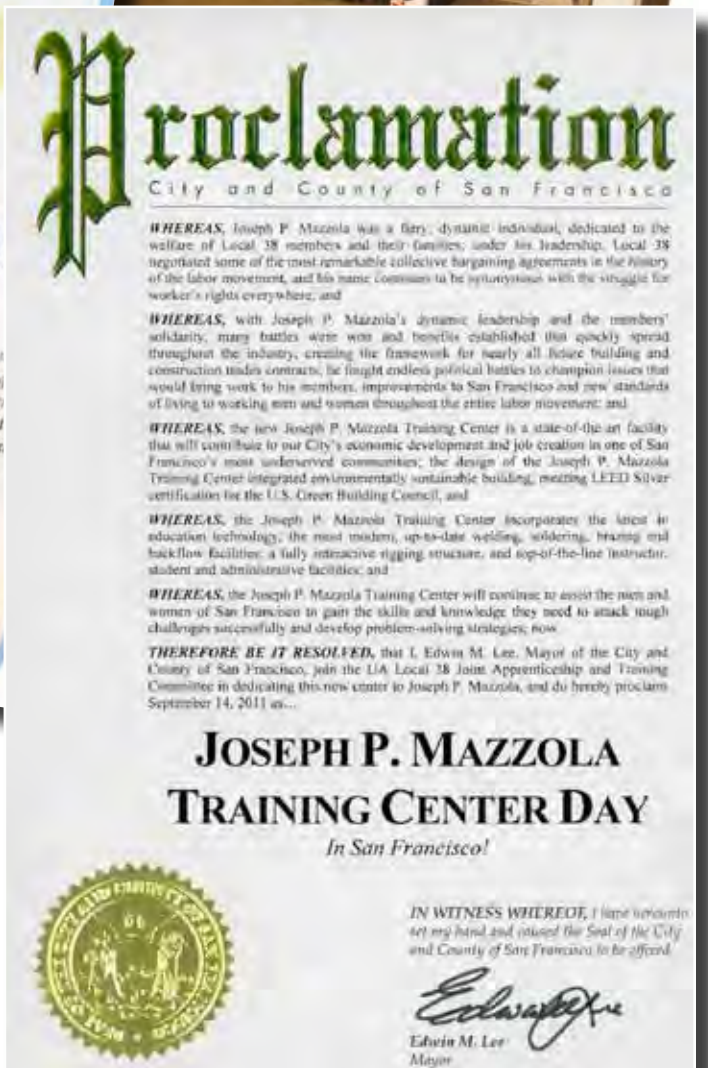

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## TRAINING FACILITY

All of which are the reasons the new Joseph P. Mazzola Training Center is important to the future of Local 38. We had an outstanding training facility at Market Street, but it was one we had simply outgrown. Our new school provides us the facilities we need to train our apprentices and journeymen for the 21st century.

First we have the latest in educational technology. Each classroom has an electronic smart board, full internet connectivity, overhead projectors and document cameras. This equipment gives our teachers the ability to find, prepare and pass on information about our trade as it changes, so our members have the latest information available.

Then we have 12,000 plus square feet of shop space designed to give our members a chance hone their skills and to work with the technology they will see in the field. We have half-a-dozen different boilers, dozens of fixtures, computerized controls, flux, wire and orbital welding, medical gas brazing, backflow valves, and a host of other training equipment and materials. We have both the room and the setup for piping projects and rigging classes. And we can easily house apprentice and journeyman classes at the same time.

## SPECIAL THANKS

All of this is because of the hard work of lots of Local 38 members and contractors. First, thanks to Training Director Steve Mazzola and Curriculum Coordinator Liam Devlin, who both spent years working on this project. Then we have Nibbi Brothers, our general contractor, and Broadway Mechanical and Pribuss Engineering, our signatory contractors who worked on the building. Another thank you goes to District Council 36 for their help financing the project, and to all the Local 38 instructors who contributed their expertise to the project.

## NOT A NEW IDEA

While Newhall Street is a nice, new facility, it is important to remember it does not represent a new idea. The man for whom the building is named, Joe Mazzola, always understood the importance of training and education. Maybe because he had to leave school in the fourth grade, Joe seemed to have a special understanding of the difference education could make in the lives of working men and women. He knew that only the best trained, most knowledgeable workers could demand the best wages, working conditions and benefits.

He understood education was the key to the future for working families. So he set up his training programs for members, Camp Konocti and a college scholarship program for member's children.

It is this vision that is fulfilled in our new training center, and that will carry us into the future.

In later life when he was busy leading one of the premiere building trades unions in the country that love led him to found—along with his union brothers and sisters—the Konocti Harbor Resort and Spa, and for the sons and daughters of Local 38, Camp Konocti. Then when he had time it led him to the track.
